As we welcome Autumn and its beautiful fall colors, it's worth noting that the pace behind the scenes at the Robbins Hunter Museum has been steadily picking up.

In late August, we said goodbye to Darcy Warden, our former Administrator, and quickly welcomed two new staff! As the saying goes, many hands make light work, and to hire Shannon Langford as our new Administrator and Shauna Orr, as our new Communications Manager, is a



great blessing to the museum. Their enthusiasm, appreciation of this historical gem and moxie to get things done are contagious, and I hope you will join me in welcoming these talented women to our team.

A top priority this past quarter has been fundraising for our gutters, siding and columns. The Board and staff are learning a lot, and what was originally deemed a simple maintenance need is now morphing into a bigger restoration project. Thank you to everyone who has supported these efforts! Our Buildings and Grounds committee continues to monitor these maintenance needs and collect expert advice on how best to move forward. A capital campaign will likely emerge as we learn more, and we ask that you please excuse the dust as we deal with some short-term fixes and gather intelligence for our longer-term restoration schedule.

One of our collective goals this year has been to increase the membership of the museum. Currently, we have about 120 members, and the Board and I hope to reach the goal of 150 members by the end of 2021. Membership does indeed have its benefits (see those here), and it is also worth noting that your membership dollars are yet another way you can support this public sector, non-profit organization with its general operating funds. Your membership allows us to plan an even more dynamic 2022 and helps to ensure that the Robbins Hunter Museum will be here for future generations to enjoy and uplift.

I am sad to share that Tom Wortham, a beloved Board member from 2015 – 2019, passed away on Oct. 8, 2021. He loved the Robbins Hunter Museum, and you may remember him for his talks on Mark Twain, and his friendship with Ann Lowder, the former director. Tom recently re-engaged with the Board and staff to raise money for the Ann K. Lowder Fund. This fund will benefit the museum's programming and is being established at the Licking County Foundation. Victoria Woodhull Woman of Achievement Award

Rita Kipp: 2020 Honoree

We are pleased to announce Rita Kipp was awarded the 2020 Victoria Woodhull Woman of Achievement award.

Rita is the president of the League of Women Voters of Licking County. This award is in recognition of her work ensuring voting rights for all citizens of Licking County.

"The National Woman Suffrage Association became the League of Women Voters after the ratification of



the 19th amendment. From 1920 to now, the LWV has been a nonpartisan

advocate for voting rights," Robbins Hunter Board of Trustees member Christina Gray said. "Watching how all of Rita's hard work has revitalized the League of Women Voters of Licking County was what made her the perfect choice for us."

Robbins Hunter Board of Trustees member Judith Dann explained why the award is in honor of Victoria Claflin Woodhull. "She laid the ground work for more autonomy for women, more protection of children, more recognition of laborers and more reform of education and government."

The museum is proud to have an exhibit and clock tower dedicated to Woodhull.

Docent Honored

Docent Dorothy Garrett was recently inducted into the Central Ohio Senior Citizens Hall of Fame, for making a positive difference in Licking County.

Garrett has served the community as a former school teacher, member of the Granville Village Council, and docent at the Robbins Hunter Museum, the Granville Historical Society, and the Columbus Museum of Art.

The Ohio Senate issued a proclamation naming Garrett as one of Ohio's finest citizens.
