We reached our fundraising goal and had a fun mix of in-person and virtual events to keep our community safe and our members participating in ways that made everyone feel comfortable.

Anyone who has ever put on a big event knows there are many stories within stories, and the staff, Board and volunteers who helped to create this event magic can certainly share their stories. Some of my



highlights include: Reaching our fundraising goal of \$10,000, bringing my best friends to the Octagon Room for the Live Virtual Auction, hearing Debra Knapke's plant knowledge, the children read their poetry and the 1500 Trees dedication, picking daffodils with Chloe Dickson and Andrew Heminger at Jill Griesse's former garden, and finally giving Darcy Warden a high five for all of her amazing work (we never even shook hands this past year).

Our docent extraordinaire, Becky Dungan, has begun a docent training, and we welcome our members and guests to become docents! If you love Granville, architecture, and/or history, please consider joining our small team of docents to share your passion about this beautiful place with the greater community.

We have some summer fun planned, so please mark your calendar: Music 4U! – June 20, July 18, & August 15, from 7 - 8 pm, as we are partnering with the Newark-Granville

Symphony Orchestra to bring you some live orchestral music from our garden folly. This event series is free and open to the public, we simply ask that you <u>register online</u>, because we have limited seating due to social distancing. Finally, it is with great need, that I alert you of our continued fundraising for our gutter repairs. This past year we gratefully received \$3,551 from the Granville Community Foundation and an additional \$1,800 from some generous donors during our Annual Fundraiser to put toward our gutter repairs. The proposed cost was \$15,000; however with increased costs for materials and the contract worker shortage, we are anticipating an increased price tag. We hope to begin the project this summer, starting with the east side of the building, and will continue until completion later this fall. If you have not contributed to this maintenance cost or can give again, please help us reach our fundraising goal of \$10,000, and make a donation to this repair. It takes a village to keep a

What's Growing in the Garden Roses and More!



Late May and early June is truly a spectacular time in the Jill Griesse Historic Gardens. The beds are awash in gorgeous purples, pinks, and every variation in between. The Museum's columbine (*Aquilegia*) is in full bloom, from the deep purple ones by the west entrance, to the cream and red ones in the front beds (these are native to Ohio), and to a wonderful double pink on the west side of the front gardens. The iris (*Germanicus*) in the front beds are

standing tall in purple and peach. The statue of the Lady is surrounded by purple Dutch Iris (*Hollandica*). Also in the Lady's Garden, our "tame" wisteria is in full bloom.

Not enough for you? The spectacular Beauty Bush (located on the east side of the front garden is in bloom. This huge example of *Linnaea amabilis* was originally a cutting donated by a Granville Garden Club member.

The four old fashioned roses in the front bed represent roses that would have been available in 1842, when the Avery-Downer house was completed. Note the wicked thorns (hybridized out of most modern roses), and the simplicity of the blossoms. But then lean in and smell their heady fragrance. In the fall, these roses form prominent orange colored hips, which would have been used to make jelly because they are full of vitamin C.

The Granville Rose lives in the parking lot area, between Alfie's, the Lady's Garden, and the Museum. Originally planted by Robbins Hunter, Jr., it is filled with buds ready to burst forth into bloom within the next two weeks. This is a glorious event each year for the Museum. What is the Granville Rose? The original rootstock was brought with settlers of the village on their long journey from Granville, Massachusetts. Only a few examples are still extant in



the village, ours and that at the Granville Historical Society, and a few propagated from them in private hands.

The Granville Rose is a tough, hardy, and very old-fashioned rose. Unlike her old-fashioned cousins in the front of the museum, she is an avid climber and needs severe cutting back and thinning of dead wood (a daunting task because this rose has thorns that bite!). She blooms once a year, and all at once, with magnificent pink blooms that have a heady, and almost overwhelming fragrance. While walking to the Library or to Elm Street using the alley, stop in the parking lot and visit a true Granville Grand Dame. You won't regret it.






Summer Reading: Out of the Shadows
